One of the only district-wide art shows in the area, Nazareth includes artwork from grades K-12 and a variety of art mediums. Nazareth has followed this tradition for over 35 years. The show was open from 7:30-3 and 6-9 PM May 17th to the 19th in the high school gymnasium. A number of students of all ages, parents, faculty, administrators, artists, and community members attended the art show to support Nazareth's young artists. A diversity of mediums such as architectural drawing, CAD drawing, graphic arts, animation, fashion design, ceramics, mosaic, non-loom fibers, metalwork, painting, photography, paper maché, collage, and printing were represented.

Many teachers brought their classes to view the show. Other classes participated in critiques and discussions. One English teacher had her class view the artwork and relate it to different works of literature; she found that her students made unique connections between their peers' work and their reading.

Each year a team of artists comes into the show to judge the work. This year, the elementary and middle school art teachers did the judging. Awards are given for both full portfolios of work and individual pieces. The individual pieces are judged on quality criteria such as best use of the medium, creativity, concept, technicality, experimentation and presentation.

The high school students did more than display their choice artwork; they used the Art Show as an opportunity to express themselves and convey messages by manipulating their space. Students who attended the show also benefitted from this learning experience. Hopefully, their background in the world of creative expression has been broadened.

NASD 2006 Community Survey Summary Result Report

In late February 2006, 12,111 questionnaires were distributed to all households in the Nazareth Area School District. As of the end of March cut-off, 2,287 responses had been received by the processor. This 19% participation rate is considered good for the process and complexity of this survey. This report shows the results of the survey in the same format as the original questionnaire for context. All results (unless noted) are shown as a percent of those responding on that particular item. If multiple responses were permitted the total will add to more than 100%. Other small deviations are attributable to rounding. Due to space restrictions, this newsletter only contains excerpts from the report. NOTICE OF IMPORTANT RIGHTS - The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parent and students over 18 4. The right to refuse the designation of any or all the categories of directory informayears of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. They are:

1. The right to review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the District receives a request for access.

Parents or eligible students should submit to the school principal a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.

2. The right to request the amendment of a student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate or misleading.

Parents or eligible students may ask the Nazareth Area School District to amend a record believed to be inaccurate or misleading. They should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading. If the District does not amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the District will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise of the right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

3. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One example which permits disclosure without consent is to disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including clerical staff, health or medical staff, and law enforcement unit personnel); a person on the School Board; a person or company with whom the District has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks). A school official has a legitimate education interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

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The District is permitted by law to disclose directory information without the written consent of the parent or eligible student. The parent or eligible student has the right to refuse to permit the disclosures of any or all directory information if a written refusal is forwarded to the building principal no later than September 15th of the current school year. Upon request, the District discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. "Directory information" may be disclosed without consent unless the parent or eligible student requests that the information not be disclosed. "Directory information" includes the student's name, address, telephone number; date and place of birth; program; dates of attendance; participation in recognized activities and sports; weight and height of members of athletic teams; degrees, certificates, and awards received; and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student.

5. The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education. A parent or an eligible student may file a complaint concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The Office that administers FERPA

Additionally, Section 4155 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA), 20 U.S.C.§ 7165m as amended by the NCLB, requires the transfer of disciplinary records, with respect to a suspension or expulsion, by the school district, to any private, or public elementary school or secondary school for any student who is enrolled or seeks, intends, or is instructed to enroll, on a full- or part-time basis.

Section 9528 of the ESEA, 20 U.S.C. § 7908, as amended by the NCLB, and 10 U.S.C. 503, as amended by § 544 of the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2002 (Pub.L.No. 107-107), require the school district to:

- give military recruiters the same access to secondary school students as provided to postsecondary institutions or to prospective employers; and
- provide students' names, addresses, and telephone listings to military recruiters, when requested, unless a parent has opted out of providing such information. (Military Recruiter Guidance is on FPCO Website.)




