

American Government and Economics

Course Description

The course will be divided into two disciplines: United States Government and Economics. The course will begin by developing an understanding of the Constitution and its principles as a foundation of our governmental system. Students will then take an in-depth look into the three branches of government analyzing the origins, structure, functions and connection to the American citizenry. In the analysis of our Judicial Branch, the students will explore landmark Supreme Court cases associated with the many issues of our contemporary world. Lastly, students will explore political ideology and our political system.

In the second portion of the course, students will have an opportunity to learn and apply the concepts used to understand basic Economics and an analysis of specific contemporary examples. Students will master economic concepts including scarcity, opportunity cost, supply, demand, elasticity, competition, and globalization. Students will examine America's economic history and economic challenges in an effort to develop a more sophisticated worldview.
